The Carriage of Goods by Sea Act is a United States statute governing the rights and responsibilities between shippers of cargo and ship-owners regarding ocean shipments to and from the United States. It is the U.S. enactment of the International Convention Regarding Bills of Lading, commonly known as the "Hague Rules". It was found in Title 46 Appendix of the United States Code, starting at Section 1301, but has been moved to a note in 46 United States Code 30701. The United States Congress, co

The law of carriage of goods by sea is a body of law that governs the rights and duties of shippers, carriers and consignees of marine cargo. Primarily concerned with cargo claims, this body of law is an aspect of international commercial law and maritime law. The typical obligations of a carrier by sea to a shipper of cargo are: to provide a seaworthy ship to issue a bill of lading to "properly and carefully load, handle, stow, carry, keep, care for, and discharge the goods carried". to proceed

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The contract of carriage of goods by sea can easily be seen as a contract involving two parties who for an agreed sum agree to be bound by the terms reached by them. But this definition may be very misleading, for though the contract of carriage involve this important element it is not the same as the usual contracts reached and agreed by parties.

PARTIES UNDER THE CONTRACT OF CARRIAGE OF GOODS BY SEA

The contract of carriage by sea is an aspect of the shipping law which has attracted strategic significance because the bulk of international trade is

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transacted through this medium. Carriage of goods may be by land (railway transport and road transport), by air, or by sea. In this paper, we shall focus on the contract of carriage by sea.

THE CONTRACT OF CARRIAGE OF GOODS BY SEA

Over the past decades, carriage of goods by sea has been regulated by many varying pieces of laws including The Hague Rules, Hague-Visby Rules and Hamburg Rules and other national variations in some countries (McLaughlin, 2009).

UNITED NATIONS CONVENTION ON THE CARRIAGE OF GOODS BY SEA ...

- "This Bill of Lading, so far as it relates to the carriage of goods by water, shall have effect, subject to the provisions of the Carriage of Goods by Sea Act of the United States, approved April 16, 1936, which shall be deemed to be incorporated herein, and nothing herein contained shall be deemed a surrender by the carrier of any of its rights or immunities or an increase of any of its responsibilities or liabilities under said Act.

If part of the carriage is by sea or inland water and part by road, the act applies to the land part only. For many decades the law governing the international carriage of goods by railway has been codified in a number of international conventions. These are frequently referred to as the Berne Conventions.

The only responsibility of the seller is to ensure that the goods are placed on board the ship and the consignee will arrange for the carriage. Therefore the ship is directed by the consignee and accordingly even the insurance is paid for the carriage by the consignee. The above contract is different to a contract on CIF terms.

Carriage of Goods by sea Charterparty - The Marine-Eduaction

Subject to the provisions of Article VI, under every contract of carriage of goods by sea the carrier, in relation to the loading, handling, stowage, carriage, custody, care, and discharge of such goods, shall be subject to the responsibilities and liabilities, and entitled to the rights and immunities hereinafter set forth.

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
