The Old School-New School Controversy was a schism of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America which took place in 1837 and lasted for over 20 years. The Old School, led by Charles Hodge of Princeton Theological Seminary, was much more conservative theologically and was not supportive of revivalism. It called for traditional Calvinist orthodoxy as outlined in the Westminster standards. The New School derived from the reconstructions of Calvinism by New England ...

He supported the Old School in the Old School-New School Controversy, which resulted in a split in 1837. In 1840 he became Professor of Didactic Theology, retaining, however, the department of New Testament exegesis, the duties of which he continued to discharge until his death.

The nineteenth century Old School Presbyterian theologian Charles Hodge wrote in his Systematic Theology, "...it is a fact that unless children are brought up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, they, and the society which they constitute or control, will go to destruction. Consequently, when a state resolves that religious instruction shall be banished from the schools and other literary institutions, it virtually resolves on self-destruction".

The Old School faction was led by theologian Charles Hodge at Princeton University. In reaction to conservative domination at Princeton, the New Schoolers created Union Theological Seminary in New York City. Although these opposing poles were not geographically far apart, they did tend to have different regional bases of support.

Hodge graduated from Princeton University in 1815. He became professor of biblical literature at Princeton Theological Seminary in 1822 and professor of theology in 1840.

Much as he was concerned about some of the abolitionist tendencies in the New School party, he took a moderating position in the Old School/ New School debates, accepting that most of that New School party was orthodox in faith. He was not initially in favor of the purge of the New School Presbyteries in 1837.

Charles Hodge was born on December 27, 1797 and passed on to his eternal reward on June 19, 1878.Subsequent to his death, and early in July of 1878, on the pages of The Christian Observer, this brief note appeared under the title, "Calvinism and Piety." The Christian Union, which has no friendship for Calvinism, closes its article on the death of Dr. Hodge, as follows:

June 19: Death of Charles Hodge

Hodge was born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania on the 28th of December 1797. He graduated at the College of New Jersey (now Princeton) in 1815, and in 1819 at the Princeton Theological seminary, where he became an instructor in 1820, and the first professor of Oriental and Biblical literature in 1822.
