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Non Suicidal Self Injury In

Nonsuicidal self injury (NSSI) is more common in adolescent and young adult populations than previously thought. Although it is important to assess the associated risk of suicidal behavior, NSSI is generally used to cope with distressing negative affective states, especially anger and depression, and mixed emotional states.

Nonsuicidal Self injury in Adolescents

Nonsuicidal self-injury (NSSI) refers to any premeditated, self-directed actions that leads to direct damage of body tissues (Kerr, Muehlenkamp, & Turner, 2010)This action is often marked in an array of ways, like hitting or punching an object to inflict injury to self, cutting, extreme scratching, skin carving, and interference with wound healing and burning.

Non-Suicidal Self-Injury Self-injury is an expression of acute psychological distress. It is an act done to oneself, by oneself, with the intention of helping oneself rather than killing oneself.

Summary of Non-Suicidal Self-Injury

Current research indicates that non-suicidal self-injury occurs often among individuals in treatment for a substance use disorder. In one study, 30% of those in treatment reported a history of self-harm, with 50% of these individuals reporting the use of self-harm behavior within the past year (Gratz & Tull, 2010).

Addressing Non-Suicidal Self Injury (NSSI) within the ...

People who engage in non-suicidal self-injury are at higher risk of a suicide attempt. About 10% of people who had injured themselves in the last four weeks had made a suicide attempt in the last year, and about 60% had had thoughts of suicide.

Nonsuicidal self-injury, often simply called self-injury, is the act of deliberately harming your own body, such as cutting or burning yourself. It's typically not meant as a suicide attempt. Rather, this type of self-injury is a harmful way to cope with emotional pain, intense anger and frustration.

Non-suicidal self-injury can include a wide variety of behaviors, but common forms include cutting, self-scratching, burning, and punching objects. The risk of NSSI is particularly high in adolescence: the mean age at onset peaks around the age of 14–15. A second peak is common around the age of 20 in college samples.

Non-suicidal self-injury (NSSI) is defined as deliberately injuring oneself without suicidal intent. The most common form of NSSI is self-cutting, but other forms include burning, scratching, hitting, intentionally preventing wounds from healing, and other similar behaviors.

Nonsuicidal self-injury is a self-inflicted act that causes pain or superficial damage but is not intended to cause death. Although the methods used sometimes overlap with those of suicide attempts (eg, cutting the wrists with a razor blade), nonsuicidal self-injury is distinct from suicide because patients do not intend the acts to be lethal.
