Improving Obstetric Triage - BCH Outreach

Healthcare facilities providing inpatient obstetrical care should limit visitors to pregnant women who have known or suspected COVID-19 infections. Visitors should be limited to those essential for the pregnant woman's well-being and care (emotional support persons).

Considerations for Inpatient Obstetric Healthcare Settings ...

The Obstetrical Triage Acuity Scale (OTAS) has been designed to

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establish a national standard that allows departments providing obstetrical assessment to evaluate acuity level and set guidelines for timely care. All patients presenting to the obstetrical triage area are triaged and prioritized according to the OTAS tool.

Obstetric Triage - Obstetric triage volume typically exceeds the overall birth volume of a hospital by 20-50% - Pregnant women most commonly present for evaluation of labor at term - Other common reasons for triage visits-Preterm labor-Signs & symptoms of preeclampsia-Decreased fetal movement-Preterm premature rupture of membranes-Vaginal bleeding

Hospitals have incorporated triage principles into the practice of OB by either establishing stand-alone OB triage units or creating triage areas adjacent to the L&D department. 13 Qualified nursing personnel, including nurse-midwives, nurse practitioners, and clinical nurse specialists often staff these units. Typically, laboring patients who present to obstetric triage are assessed and transferred to the L&D department.

The Association of Women's Health, Obstetric and Neonatal Nurses (AWHONN) defines obstetric (OB) triage as "the brief, thorough, and systematic maternal and fetal assessment performed when a pregnant woman presents to care to determine priority for full evaluation" (AWHONN, 2014, p. 16).

The most common task required of obstetric triage personnel is labor evaluation. Several maternal symptoms require special evaluation. These include abdominal trauma, vaginal bleeding, motor vehicle accidents, decreased fetal movements, abdominal pain, and leakage of fluid.
