The Socio-economic Duty will support this through ensuring that those taking strategic decisions: take account of evidence and potential impact; through consultation and engagement; understand the views and needs of those impacted by the decision, particularly those who suffer socio-economic disadvantage; welcome challenge and scrutiny

The socio-economic duty requires public bodies to adopt transparent and effective measures to address the inequalities that result from differences in occupation, education, place of residence or social class. However, successive governments have refused to enact it as law.

The Socio-Economic Duty is the missing piece in equality legislation. Whilst a wide range of inequalities including age, gender and race are included, socio-economic status remains a glaring omission. This means the government has no duty to think about reducing poverty and inequality in their policy and decision making.

The socio-economic duty: A powerful idea hidden in plain sight in the Equality Act. Section 1 of the Equality Act 2010 asks public authorities to actively consider the way in which their policies and their most strategic decisions can increase or decrease inequalities. The socio-economic duty asks particular public authorities to do more to tackle the inequalities of outcome caused by socio-economic disadvantage.

The Socio Economic Duty - Scottish Government - Citizen Space

Section 1 of the Equality Act 2010 imposes a duty on public bodies, when making strategic decisions, to consider how they can reduce the inequalities of outcome that result from socioeconomic disadvantage. To take effect, though, this provision requires a formal decision by the Government to activate it, or as is known technically, to commence it.

To do this, we're introducing a new 'socio-economic duty'. This means that important public bodies - like local councils and your local NHS - will have to think carefully about how to reduce poverty and inequality whenever they make the big decisions that are important to all of us.

Socio-economic duty. Public sector to do more to reduce inequalities. In a UK first, public bodies in Scotland will be required to put reducing poverty and inequality at the heart of their decision making. The introduction of a socio-economic duty was included in the UK Government's Equality Act 2010 – however, it was never implemented.

The Fairer Scotland Duty is intended to reduce the inequalities of outcome caused by socio-economic disadvantage. By inequalities of outcome, we mean any measurable differences between those who have experienced socio-economic disadvantage and the rest of the population – for example, in relation to health and life expectancy or educational attainment.

The Government failed to implement this socio-economic duty in 2010, but it is not too late. There is a perfect opportunity to announce the commencement of section 1 in the green paper on social justice, expected in February.

The duty aims to tackle a problem. There's a clear link between socio-economic disadvantage and inequality. The socio-economic duty hopefully means the bodies mentioned above can do things differently, and reduce poverty in Wales.

In its most basic form, the socio-economic duty will 'require specified public bodies, when making strategic decisions such as 'deciding priorities and setting objectives', to consider how their decisions might help to reduce the inequalities associated with socio-economic disadvantage.'
